You should join Anglica for life.

What is any good for?

Unless you've browsed through everything on our website, or have your dear older sibling at this department, you may be wondering what we do, why Anglica exists, and why we insist you should join this association. Please take a moment to hear some answers to all of the above.

Established in 1958 for all students of English Philology, Anglica has sought to offer a community, a place where you can come and meet people for no further reason. We arrange various happenings, parties, sports activities, relaxed nights involving board games and food, as well as events related to traditional festivities such as Halloween and Thanksgiving.

You certainly needn't worry whether someone you know is going to come to an Anglica event you're planning to participate. Any Anglica gathering is a place for bonding, and every member or member-to-be is always welcome. For some events, such as Survival, Little Xmas or Vappubooli we get dozens and dozens of participants; ninth year students, freshmen, you name it.

Yes, and in the case of night club parties the size of the crowd naturally swells. What we want to emphasize, then, is do not hesitate but come and make this association your own!

Not only for free-time activities, Anglica also functions as a body that protects your interests studywise. For a few years now, we've appointed a board member for this, the one bearing the title "Educational Affairs". This is the person you can go to if you have any doubts concerning the course and study unit regulations at the department, if the faculty student counsellor is too busy, or if you have faced disrespectful behaviour or unjust course assesment by any of the university staff. Anglica can help with issues such as these while keeping your anonymity if necessary. We can contact people at TYY, or the person in question for you and try to solve the problem. Moreover, two Anglica representatives meet with the department staff once a month by joining their weekly staff meeting. You are welcome to suggest issues we should bring up there, anything related to studying at the English department.

That's approximately the time it takes to graduate.

Just how do we go about all this? In November the organization, ie the members, (s)elect the board of nine members for the following calendar year. Every member of Anglica, that is any person who has paid the membership for either one or five years, has a right to vote or stand in as a candidate at the general assembly. Sounds grand, but truthfully speaking, there rarely is much contest for the board positions. The general meeting tends to end in happy agreement of who takes which spot. This doesn't mean it has to remain so. If during this autumn you hear somebody say they hope for such and such a place in the Anglica board for next year, don't let it bring you down. If you wish to become a board member, you have a good chance of becoming just that. The spots are always negotiable -or "votable". And Anglica ALWAYS needs active, engaging freshmen- and women! Hereby I'll simply say, get involved, ok!

HUMANITAS – A STUDENT ORGANIZATION FOR THE WHOLE FACULTY

Humanitas is the student organization for the Faculty of Humanities. Humanitas was founded in January 2006 and Anglica is one of its 22 member organizations. Our main aim is to promote co-operation between our member organizations especially in educational issues. We for example arrange meetings for the student representatives in different organs of the faculty and inform students about different kinds of actual matters that have to do with studying. Even though Humanitas mainly focuses on educational issues we sometimes also organize bigger parties for all the students in our faculty!

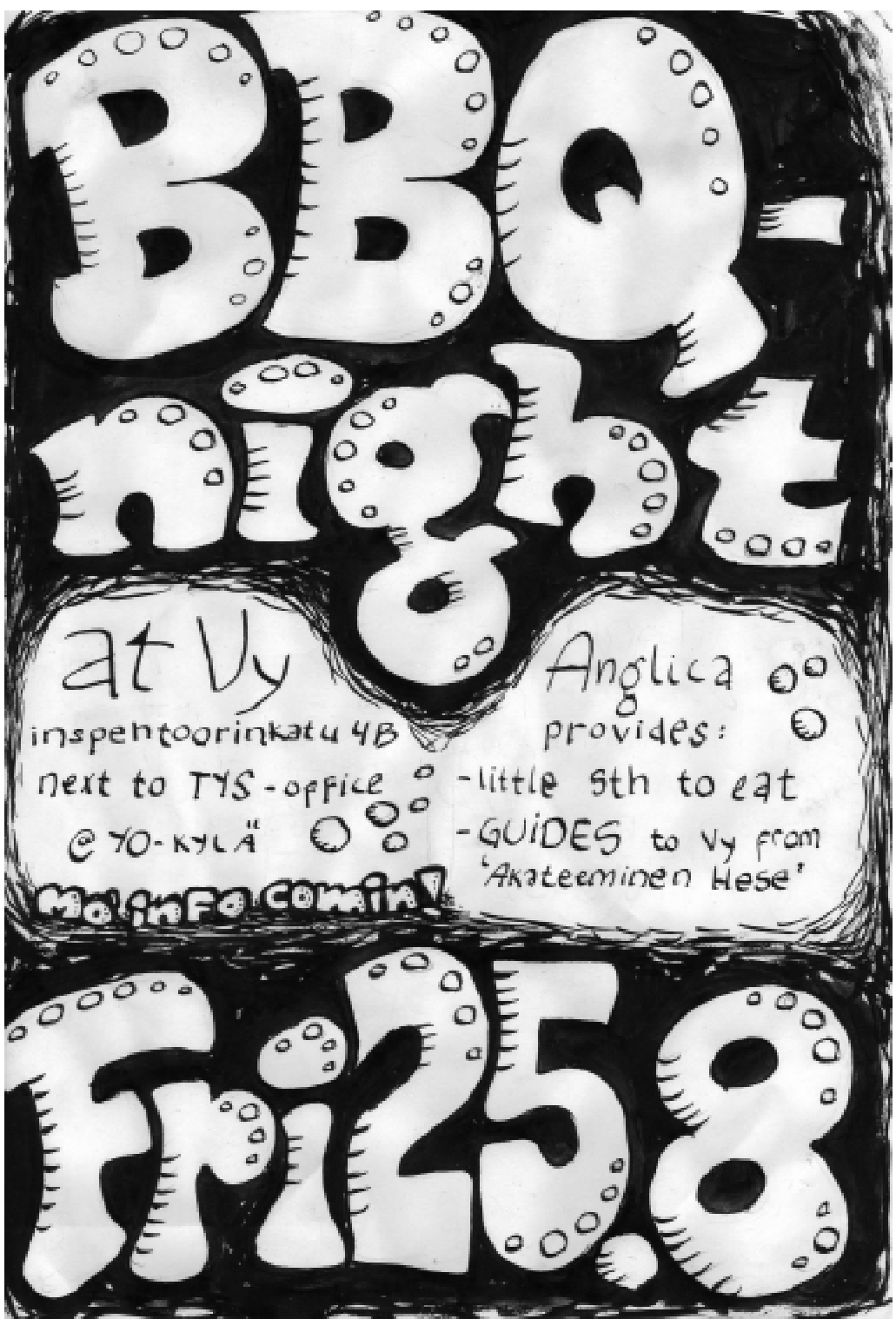

Overalls: What the hey?

Most people come to the university to look sophisticated. Some to study. Personally I came because Juslenia matches the color of my favorite shoes.

But when I came, I realized that the campus isn't a haven for the well-dressed. For me, even. History students dress in brown corduroy and English students have simply no clue that purple is so passé. Sometimes they mogle around dressed in baggy overalls and sing something about hell and gore. So appalling. What is the deal with these overalls anyway?

Read the following interview I did with myself.

So, what are they?

Overalls are the student's uniform. They are worn by university and polytechnic-students. Some people prefer cloaks to overalls, because they believe it gives them the ability to fly. Most students take a more down-to-earth approach to uniforms and prefer overalls because they protect the wearer from dirt, rock and the effects of excess boozing.

When?

Overalls are worn at parties and other informal student events. Besides keeping the young student flesh intact, they bring a sense of unity. Overalls are worn to demonstrate who we are. Each student organization or school has its own color and sign to signify that the wearer studies at such and such a place and this certain subject.

Tags?

Students are prone to decorating their overalls with badges and gadgets. Badges vary in purpose and appearance. Some badges are more formal than others. Meet the family, or more specifically, take a look at what each member's role in running this organisation is. See, you could be stepping in one of these positions next year!



Chairperson: Minna

The Chair's most visible assignment is running the meetings, and planning the agendas for them once a week and trying to pull together the board's hopefully unanimous decisions. The Chairperson also has the ungratifying task of distributing tasks to the other members, preferably so that nobody becomes too loaded with work. The chair is the person with the duty of filling in the official papers to TYY and some others, and handling most of the email from the student union and from other student organisations. She also participates the

staff meeting once a month with another board member. All in all, the Chair has to keep track of things being done, and those that ought to be done.



Vice Chairperson: Sonja

As the title reveals, this member is the one to stand in if the Chair falls sick, but she is often an invaluable source of ideas -and the board's common memory - as the specific tasks for her are fewer than for the rest. The Vice Chair might easily end up taking care of things that aren't designed for any other board member, but one annual task is copying and selling course literature sets especially to first-year students. The Vice Chair is often the other board member to join the staff meeting each month.

Treasurer: Maiju If you are one of those quirky humanists with a suspicious fascination towards math and accounting, this is the dream spot for you. The treasurer keeps watch on our funds and advises the rest of us on what we can afford and what we certainly cannot. She also keeps record of all our expenses, and the money we receive, membership fees and bakesale profits, for example. The treasurer also sees to that all cruise, theatre and such ticket fees are being paid to the account, correctly and on time. With the chair, she plans the yearly budget. The treasurer also updates the membership register.



Secretary: Santti The main job for him is to listen and listen (talking isn't banned, though!) at the meetings and draw out the minutes after each meeting and hang them up in H2 for any Anglica member to see. Admittedly, this can be a tough one, as the meetings may sidetrack from each point in the agenda just about every time. On the other hand, the Secretary can simply decide once the matter at hand has been settled and close his ears til something relevant comes up again. It has been an Anglica tradition to hand over this position to a first-year student. Wink wink.



Educational Affairs: Taru This is a relatively new position in the board, only since 2004, actually. She is the third board member who can take part in the staff meetings. She also participates TYY's kopo (koulutuspoliittinen sektori) meetings that deal with more general and all-embracing decisions, and conflicting aims at university level nationwide, but also educational issues related to our university only. Her job, then, is to inform the board and all Anglica members on any burning developments, or backlashes...She is also in charge of tutoring, ie helping in finding and selecting them, and she operates as a link between Anglica's board and the tutors.



Info-person: Johanna The info's most important job is to sketch the fancy ads of our events onto the notice board and to email the member list of those happenings. The ads in this publication, too, are her design. She is also responsible for emailing Anglica's info column to Tykkäri each fortnight. Last but not least, the annual board poster on the notice board comes from her skilful hands and remains in Anglica archives for posterity. The info might also end up helping out on party decorations due to the artsy aspirations this member often possesses.



Projects and Sports: KAntti Projects may sound a vague thing to handle, but what we mean by them are usually bakesales four times a year at the Juslenia lobby, and overall orders for the freshmen-and women every autumn. Keeping sports activities running are his duty, too, floorball being the most regular one, and Megazone the one with most passionate fans. The editor's role of our publications, Bacchanalia and Rookie Guide, often falls under his responsibility.



Party and Culture: Heidi and Lilli

This sector is considered so important that every year we appoint two people to manage it. Their job is usually to call and make reservations for party premises, or ticket reservations to cruises and theatre visits etc. and to contact other student associations for possible shared parties. They may also help

the info person with designing advertisements. The two party bosses are also responsible for decorations at the party place if need be. A good knowledge, or pure enthusiasm, for the Turku nightlife and cultural possibilities is a huge asset here, for fresh ideas are always welcome.

Päiväkoti ****- K20

Kaskenkatu 3

Clubgallery. Young Finnish artists/designers. A very relaxed and warm atmosphere. Dj's usually well chosen. Gigs. There can be a different theme or club for every night of the week. Trendy. You can also get some reading done using the wallpaper-vogue-qmuoto- magazine wall by the counter. The staff is great. *Music: reggaesoulfunkhipopacidgrooooooves [+bands+rock]*

Rento ****- K22

Aurak.14

Great terrace, open all night during summer. Interior changes often. Xpensive. Onnela's "chill-out-room". Good service. *Music: [hard]rock all night*

Sevilla *** K18

Humalistonkatu 2

A hotel bar and restaurant. The Sbonus card gives you discounts on certain days. Not exactly big, but big enough if you count the restaurant tables too. Good and cheap tapasthingies if you're just a bit hungry. *Music: hotel music.*

Uusi Apteekki * K20**

Apteekki, Koulu, Pankki.. in the end, they're all the same. No music and people drinking beer. Good choice, still. Apteekki is slightly more popular now than it used to be. And the sole reason for that is that "Vares", the movie, was partly filmed there. Pharmacy interior.[naturally, and naturally it looks great next to a pint of cold beer] *Music: niks*

Whiskey Bar * K18**

Aurakatu 15?

Last but not least the bar with THE jukebox, at least for many Anglicans we know. A sweaty small bar with the heavy guys'n'girls. Whiskey of the week is usually a good choice. Wild. *Music: testosterone rock*

PLACES TO EAT



Myssy *** / *Corridor between Main Building and the Maths and Sciences Department*

Well. At times the food feels great going into your abdomen. This is mostly when you're really hungry. Lunch time is always over by the time you get there and if you get there at the right time, it's crowded. But don't be discouraged, there is always space for he who dares. The Math side of the café (Myssy) is meant for students, the Main Building side is meant for staff (Silinteri). But who cares, really? Enough with the age racism. Great sandwiches and drinks, also functions as a café. Pop in for a take away on your way to a lecture, especially if you're already late.

MacchiaVelli **** / *Educarium, Assistentinkatu 5*

Pretty good food. Regular munch with customary •2.35* price, and luxurious grill-side with pizza and items I don't think I can afford with the current student grant policy. oesn't mean that they're expensive, only says something about the students' socioeconomic position. Spacy if you don't mind the space being constantly crowded. Yet, I give it a thumbs up. Lots of snacks and treats to take away.

V.I.P. ** / *Datacity, Lemminkäisenkatu*

Pretty good food, bad location. This is the training cafeteria for students in the hotel and restaurant field, which means that the food and service will range from excellent to teenage angst. Some times it's worth the walk, sometimes it's not. Take a chance. Peasoup and corresponding dessert every Thursday, no extra fee for pancake. These people will ask for your student card.

Café Gadolinia *** / *Åbo Akademi, Porthaninkatu 3, 2nd floor*

Close to Juslenia. Good food, friendly service. No Swedish-speaking skills required but may work to your advantage especially when reading the menu. Very crowded straight after 12 but at other times the lines are not too bad.

You should drag your ass to Proffa on your first day on the Hill.

Käärerestaurang ** / Hämeenkatu 22

Mainly for Åbo Akademi students, but who knows? Maybe you could fit in. Gigs at night time.

Hammas (Dentalia) * / Lemminkäisenkatu 2, round building**

Mainly for dentists-to-be and dental staff. Abundance of white coats. Smells sterile. Good food. Basic stuff. Tested and proved positive.

Mikro * / Kiinanmyllynkatu 13**

Mainly for doctors-to-be and doctoral staff. Abundance of white coats.

Monttu * / Rehtorinpellonkatu 3-5**

The KKK (Kauppakorkeakoulu) dining place. Apparently good food, but don't go there if you're feeling poor. Not that it costs more, but all the rich kids with daddy's BMWs will start pissing you off. Lots of pretty girls and boys that look alike.

Second opinion: If you ever need to be reminded of why you're a Humanist and of where you belong, just take a stroll to the Monttu and meet The Economy, The Business, The Money, The...erm, Cleanliness, and the geometrical precision of lining up, where you're nevertheless at loss with finding your veggie meal. You'll go crying back to Assari and swear it eternal fidelity.

BioCity, Amica restaurant * / Tykistökatu 6**

If you fancy a slightly posher atmosphere this is the place to go. All of their portions are not student priced so watch it when you choose what to eat! Quite far from the University Hill so don't try to make it there on a half an hour lunchbreak! Food tends to be rather good.

Pharmacy, Amica restaurant * / Itäinen pitkäkatu 4**

Everything that was said about the previous restaurant pretty much applies here. The two Amica restaurants are located very close to each other (just cross the street) so if the menu on the first one does not please you, try the other!

Tottisalmi ** / Kirkkotie 13**

On the bottom floors of the YTHS building. Location is off, unless you're going to the doctor's. They also serve breakfast in the morning. Good food, especially on Fridays. Cheaper happy hour for late lunchers.

And every day after that...



Assarin ullakko ** / *Rehtorinpellonkatu 4, YO-talo A*

The food. Don't try to kid yourself by trying new alternatives. This is where you always end up. Terrible lines but amazingly there's always enough space. The true student diner. Also serves student lunches on weekends. If you hate waiting, take the veggie line. Also try this opt if you're vegetarian/vegan. Good salad tables.

Arken **** / *Tehtaankatu 2, Åbo Akademi*

This is the newest of the restaurants, opened in March 2004. Not very big but quite nice and they also have some newspapers that you can read while on your lunch – most of them are in Swedish though! Food usually good and often they have more exotic (in the good sense of the word) choices as well. Besides the usual 2,35€ option they often also serve light lunch (soup, sallad) which costs 2,10€.

Normal student price lunch costs 2,35€, cheaper light lunch options 2,10€ at most places. Some cafeterias have more expensive options as well. Prices include main course, bread, sallad and one drink. Extra fee for additional drinks (excepting water) and dessert.

N.B. Lunch times vary. Check your local dealer for exact time. Most cafeterias have a vegetarian/vegan option.

If you're good at floorball, it doesn't matter: you can still play with us.

Other options:

Bakesales at Juslenia *_*****

Student associations arrange bakesales in Juslenia more or less every day between September and the beginning of May. Sometimes there is a lot of choice, sometimes a little, sometimes not at all - depending on the amount of enthusiastic bakers. But there is at least coffee and tea and it tends to be the cheapest in campus. Supporting poor student associations is always a good thing and even more so on the days when Anglica arranges the bakesale (twice each term)!

Akateeminen Hese / Hämeenkatu

Busy food. It's a burger. Always use coupons or ask for a student discount!

Pizzeria Garda ** / Hämeenkatu 9**

Good pizza, student-friendly prices. Approx. 5e. Sometimes dubious service. Dine in or out. Remember to ask for the student discount.

Trattoria Romana ** / Hämeenkatu 9 (until 10 or 11 pm.)**

No need to search further for Italian cuisine in Turku. Mega-tasty pastas and decent pizzas with a fab ratio in price and quality. You'll get just about anything for eight to ten euro. Some say the quality and authenticity has gone down lately, but I haven't enough experience to compare. A really, truly small place, so reserve your table beforehand. The waiters are a bit gloomy. Try it anyway.

Pronto * / Hämeenkatu 1**

Nice kebab, cheesy (in both senses) pizza. Clean. Near.

Kebab *_*****

Turn a corner, any corner, and there you are. This is not zen-philosophy, this is the location of your nearest kebab. Don't go for more than 5 e. Puffing for Sisilia (Aninkaistenkatu 3) and Sydney (Kiinanmyllynkatu). Remember to ask for a student discount!
